IS YOUR FAMILY READY IN CASE OF AN EMERGENCY?

Disasters can strike at any moment, with little OR no notice.



September is National Preparedness Month, and this year's theme is "A Lasting Legacy". Disaster preparedness is something no one likes to think about, but being prepared for a disaster can make dealing with one less traumatic.

A few tips for a successful preparedness plan:

• Identify what types of disasters are most likely to happen in your area, and learn about how to best prepare for each.

- Learn about the various warnings, signals, and alerts conducive to your area.
- Tune in to emergency radio alerts for constant updates during an incident in your county.
 Identify local organizations that perform emergency management (Red Cross, nonprofits,
- etc.) and know how to get in contact with them.

• Educate yourself on any disaster plans in place at your place of work, your child's school or any place that you and your family may spend a considerate amount of time.

Your family should understand the importance of maintaining an emergency preparedness plan. Should a situation arise, each member of the family has a specific funtion, a particular set of responsibilities that as a whole results in a desired outcome. **WORK TOGETHER!** Your family will also want to determine an appropriate location to reconvene. This can be a neighbors home or even a location outside of your immediate area should you be unable to immediately return.

Now that we have our syllabus for the new school year, did you know that the State of California incorporated legislation for the establishment of the Universal Meals Program?

Right now, under Assembly Bill 130, all school aged children, kindergarten through 12th grade enrolled in public schools will be provided two free meals per day for the entirety of the school year. During each school day breakfast and lunch will be served to all students regardless of income or other factors that affected eligibility for reduced meals in the past.

Additionally, under the same law \$150 million in funding has been provided to support upgrades to kitchen infrastructure and training specifically designed to address the inclusion of nutrition-based food preparetion for school staff.

We count this as an enormous win especially in a climate where appromitely 1 in 5 residents currently struggle with food insecurity. No child left behind. No child left hungry.

3450 West St. - Contractor's Warehouse

Approved by City Council in July 2022, this project proposes to construct a single-story 2,688 square foot contractor's storage warehouse at 3450 West Street where a vacant lot currently exists. Additional improvements on the property include 2,627 square feet of landscaping, five parking spots, and a metal picket fence with telescopic gates. Public improvements include sidewalks, landscaping and five street trees along West Street.

City staff worked closely with the applicant to ensure that attractive architecture design using varied facades and building materials will be implemented in order to enhance the surrounding area and overall Broadway commercial corridor. The project will have a versatile design that will allow for future conversion to different commercial uses.
