FIRST THINGS FIRST:

ANAEROBIC DIGESTION & WHY YOU SHOULD CARE

To keep it simple, organics recycling refers to the natural conversion of materials from organic waste to energy, gas, water, and biomass.

Organic recycling usually breaks down to Anaerobic Digestion to be used mostly as energy, or to Aerobic Digestion, where it goes back to the soil and is used as biological fertilizer. After waste is sorted properly, the compost is collected by a local municipality/commercial organic recycling facility and then converted into a renewable resource.

Upwards of 40% of all food grown worldwide eventually becomes food waste that when decomposed it becomes a toxic gas known as methane which is 80% more potent than carbon dioxide.

Although a significant impact cannot be made overnight, the right information on how to handle our waste is key to establishing long-term effective habits that we can all agree on and stand by.

The Breakdown Process:

- Collection – either from your home kitchen (home compost), or to be dropped off at your local compost recycling site.
- Decontamination – for health and safety.
- Preparation – shredding or pulverizing to reduce the size of the waste articles.
- Recycling process – different organic recycling methods fit for different end products.
- Screening and grading – to add value to compost grades.

Products created from Anaerobic digestion

The anaerobic digestion process produces what is known as biogas throughout the entirety of the digestion process. Communities and business entities across the country use biogas to run alternative fuel vehicles, fuel boilers and furnaces, and power heat or electricity based engines. It is also distributed throughout natural gas pipelines and fed directly into our homes if quality standards are met.

After the breakdown process during Anaerobic Digestion, the leftover material, known as digestate, is usually what is left behind. This is what is often put to use in the bedding of livestock, fertilizers, and soil additives. In some instances the leftover result is what you find for sale in stores.



— **Senate Bill No. 1383**, approved on Sept. 19, 2016, required the State Board to implement a strategy to reduce emissions of short-lived climate pollutants to below 2013 levels.

Collecting Your Food Scraps

Collect food scraps in any container for an easy way to set aside leftovers for your green organics cart. Coffee cans, plastic food storage containers, or kitchen caddies can be used.
