This prestigious award not only recognizes the City's outstanding efforts in preparing its fiscal year 2024/25 budget book but also underscores its commitment to transparency and financial responsibility. The City had to satisfy nationally recognized guidelines for effective budget presentation to receive the budget award.

"This is a huge accomplishment for our finance team", commented Lydia Romero, City Manager. "The GFOA Award recognizes best practices in budget and policy transparency in the Annual Budget", added Romero. As the holiday season brings more travel and festivities, staying focused on the road is paramount. According to the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA), distracted driving remains a leading cause of crashes, injuries, and fatalities. In 2021 alone, distracted driving claimed 3,522 lives.

With more people traveling to see loved ones, risks of distraction such as texting, talking on the phone, and adjusting navigation are significantly heightened. Texting while driving is especially dangerous, combining visual, manual, and cognitive distractions. Just five seconds of looking at a phone at 55 mph is like driving the length of a football field with your eyes closed.

The City urges everyone to stay alert and attentive, keeping distractions away during the holiday rush. As passengers, remind drivers to stay focused so everyone can enjoy a safe season of celebration.
